

AMTRAK station closer to reality in New River Valley

[WDBJ, Roanoke] In the near future, northbound travelers in the New River Valley who want to avoid the interstate may be able to take the train. Organizers of the NRV Rail 2020 initiative gave an update on the proposed project to the Montgomery County Board of Supervisors on Monday. The state recently approved a \$350,000 operational study to determine the feasibility of the project. "Norfolk Southern actually does the study to try to give them some idea of the infrastructure changes and order of magnitude costs that might be incurred in order to make their freight lines available for passenger rail traffic," said Larry Hincker. The proposed station would be built next to the Aquatic Center in Christiansburg. But while funding for the infrastructure changes would come from the state, funding for the station itself would come from the participating localities. "Montgomery County is a partner in this effort. Blacksburg, Christiansburg, Pulaski, Radford, etc., so we want to keep people apprised as to what's going on, as well as any new information. Very specifically, the task force looking at the site is looking at ways on how to manage that and how it might be funded," Hincker said. Hincker believes the best way for NRV travelers to show support is to start riding the train now. "We think, to a certain extent, we have to prove to AMTRAK that the demand studies that we looked at will realize and come to fruition, so the best thing people can do is to get on the train and ride it," he said.

AMTRAK Looks to Refresh Long-Distance Fleet

AMTRAK has issued a Request for Information (RFI) to explore the availability of rail vehicles to eventually replace its Amfleet I equipment, which includes single-level passenger coaches used primarily east of the Mississippi River on the Northeast Regional, Keystone, Carolinian and Illinois Service. In the RFI posted on June 27, AMTRAK says it is seeking information on all types of rail vehicles including coaches, trains and self-propelled units. Following a review of what manufacturers have to offer, the operator plans to develop and release a Request for Proposal (RFP) for specific replacement vehicles in 2019. AMTRAK says although the fleet has recently undergone a refurbishment program that has replaced many interior elements including seats, carpets and lighting features, the coaches are about 40 years old and are at the point where replacement is more cost-effective than maintenance. Earlier in June, AMTRAK issued an RFP for new or rebuilt locomotives to supplement and replace its ageing national diesel locomotive fleet. AMTRAK says it is working to make immediate changes to the customer experience with improvements including refreshed trains, new fare structures, improved on-time performance, enhanced Wi-Fi connectivity, upgraded facilities and expanded onboard experience options. NC&StL 576 Moves! (Ever So Slightly)

On August 10, the Nashville Steam organization reached a milestone in the restoration of ex-NC&StL 4-8-4 #576. After nearly 65 years of lying in repose, months of volunteer work and the help of a large wrecker truck freed up wheels and running gear, allowing the locomotive to roll back a few feet. While I was on vacation during the first week of this month, I went to find some trains while





2018 Star City Railroad Tour Roanoke, Virginia October 6, 2018

Catch the bus for a spectacular railroad themed adventure that will take us to the heart of Norfolk and Western country: ROANOKE, VIRGINIA!

Widely known to many as the "Star City of the South" Roanoke was, for a hundred years, the home and headquarters for the N&W, boasting office buildings, locomotive erecting shops, maintenance facilities, railyards, passenger depots and thousands of dedicated employees. Roanoke Shops built what many experts consider to be the best steam locomotives in the world. Roanoke is still the hub for five mainlines that connect the city to Norfolk, Hagerstown, Winston-Salem, Bluefield, and Bristol. Many trains can be seen daily rolling through Roanoke, carrying all sorts of cargo destined for all over the United States. Passenger Service, in the form of AMTRAK, has just recently returned to the downtown area, although Norfolk Southern has moved most all their administrative and operating offices to either Norfolk or Atlanta, there is still a strong railroad presence and pride in the city of Roanoke, and several historical sites preserved to enjoy and connect the past with the present. We are positive that you will enjoy this trip to one of our favorite destinations.

Our journey will once again begin at the Chuckey Depot, 110 S 2ND Ave, Jonesborough, TN. (Please park in spaces closest to 2nd Street) Bus will depart promptly at 7 a.m. Trip runs rain or shine.

First Stop: Virginia Transportation Museum.

Home to the largest collection of automotive and railroad history in the state, this museum has something to please everybody as the displays themselves tell the story of transportation from many steam, electric and early diesel locomotives, to restored classic cars and trucks, as well as many transportation related artifacts to explain how America once moved. The highlight of this tour will be the chance to see the Norfolk and Western "Big Three", J-class 611, A-class 1218, and Y6a 2156. These locomotives were considered the best built, and they were built in Roanoke! As you leave, there is a wonderful gift shop with many rail related shirts, hats and other goodies.

Second Stop: O. Winston Link Museum.

During the late 1950's Mr. Link traveled several times to Virginia and West Virginia, inspired to document the last days of steam railroading in America. His specialty was trains at night, but his recordings of the steam train sound are just as famous. This museum, housed in the beautifully restored passenger depot, features hundreds of Link's original prints in both black and white and color. Interactive displays tell about Link's life, journeys and techniques. Many of his personal items are on display, even his very own N&W caboose outside. There is a gift shop on site that sells Link prints, books and other merchandise.

Lunch Stop: 611 Steakhouse.

We will stop for lunch at one of our favorite places to eat in the area, the rail-themed 611 Steakhouse (food will be paid by each individual). You can order from the menu or choose to eat from the seventy-item buffet bar.

Third Stop: The Virginian Railway Depot.

Until 1959, Roanoke was home to the Virginian Railway. After the merger with the N&W, most structures were torn down and several miles of tracks were abandoned. This station is one of very few that made it through and has been lovingly restored. A guide will be on hand from the Roanoke Chapter NRHS to discuss the history of the depot and the restoration process.

Fourth Stop: The Star of Roanoke Overlook.

Erected in 1949, this 88-foot neon star has been a shining icon overlooking the entire Roanoke Valley. From the overlook, you can get an up-close look at the majestic star as well as a beautiful panoramic view of the city of Roanoke and the different rail lines that crisscross the city. We will gather for a group photo at this point before heading back to Jonesborough.

Ticket Price: \$60 per person (includes all transportation fees and museum admissions).
